## ALCOHOL POLICY CONFERENCE SERIES

The 20<sup>th</sup> in a series of conferences on addressing prevention and reduction of alcohol-related problems using public policy strategies.

The Alcohol Policy Conferences are a series that, from the outset in 1981, have been a forum for researchers, community practitioners, and public officials to meet and exchange findings, explore evidence-based solutions, and consider adoption of policies aimed at minimizing risks associated with alcohol use. The conferences have been organized by governmental, non-governmental and private organizations over the years. The current conference is coordinated by the U.S. Alcohol Policy Alliance, a national coalition of local and state coalitions working on alcohol policy and independent of commercial interests.

- 5 **OFFER** updates on key and breaking alcohol policy issues, including health effects of new products and marketing strategies, relevant developments in global trade negotiations, groundbreaking research documenting alcohol problems while linking to alcohol policy changes, and new tools and resources available to communities seeking to promote change.
- 6 **INTRODUCE** and encourage those new to the alcohol policy field to leadership opportunities and resources, success stories and lessons learned from applying public health and public policy approaches to alcohol problems.
- 7 **CONSIDER** the future of alcohol policy in the light of health care reform and other changes in the U.S. political and public health landscape.

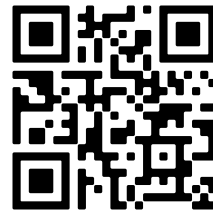

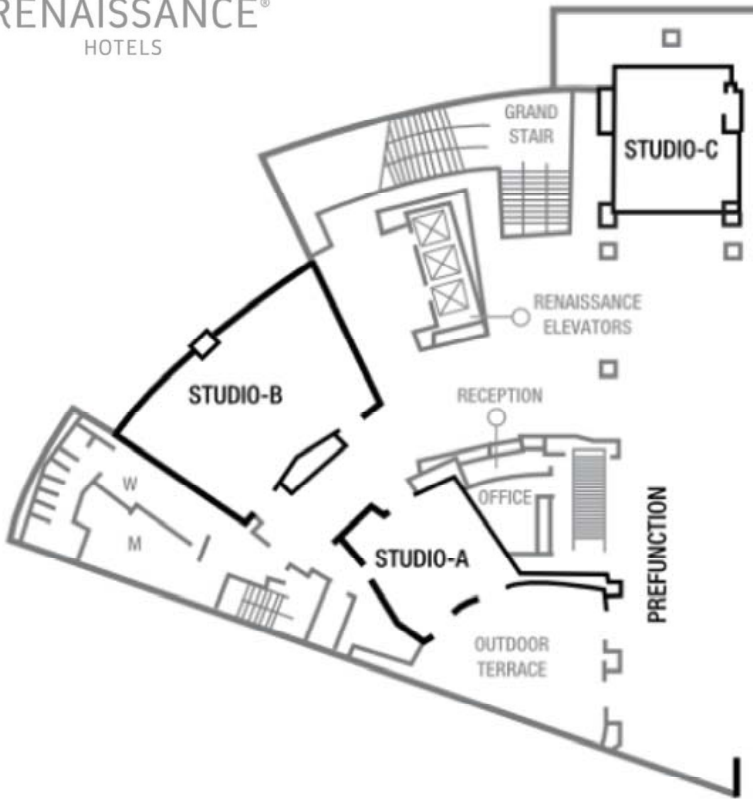
# GENERAL INFORMATION

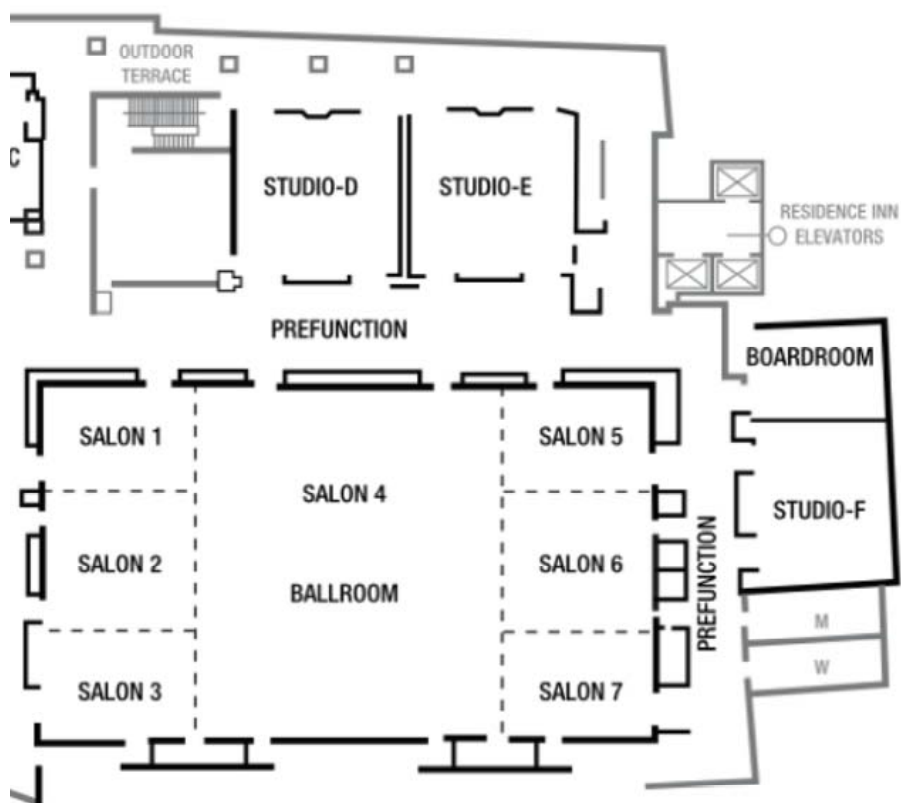
